



Louis H. Bramkamp

April 19, 1922 - March 9, 2012

Louis H. Bramkamp, 89, a resident of the Coburg Village Retirement Community in Rexford, formerly of Livingston, passed away Friday, March 9, 2012 at St. Peter's Hospital in Albany, surrounded by his family.

Born April 19, 1922 in Cincinnati, Ohio, he was the son of the late Louis and Margaret (Schick) Bramkamp.

Louis graduated from Western Hills High School in Cincinnati, where he enjoyed playing tennis, and Cornell University in Ithaca. He served in the US Army 104th Infantry during World War II, earning a Purple Heart and Oak Leaf Cluster, the American Service Medal, the European African Middle Eastern Medal, the Good Conduct Medal, and the World War II Victory Medal.

Louis was a hard working fruit farmer and owner of Bramkamp's Apple Land in Livingston for over 59 years. He was a member of the Columbia County Farm Bureau, the Cornell Cooperative Extension, the Livingston Fire Company, and the Linlithgo Reformed Church at Livingston.

He is survived by his beloved wife of 61 years, Viola (Bottle) Bramkamp of Rexford; his devoted children, Diane (Bennie "BJ") Sacco of Hudson, Nancy (Todd) Boice of Ballston Spa, and John "Jack" (Kathy) Bramkamp of San Dimas, CA; his loving sister, Shirley Olmstead of Centennial, CO., and seven devoted grandchildren, Sarah Sacco (Michael Batke), Jessica Beebe (Cory), Amber Johnson (Matt), Megan Thompson, Kelly Bramkamp, and Jason and Daniel Boice. Also surviving are three great-grandchildren, Alana, Amaya, and Elizabeth, his nephew, Chuck (Joanne) Olmstead and their son, Charles (Brea), of Colorado, a great-niece, Katie (Rob) Duboise and their family of Maine, and two close cousins, Mary Esther (Robert) Gelrich of Covington, KY and Jane Alice Foster of Cincinnati.

In addition to his parents, he was predeceased by his brother, Jack Bramkamp, who was

killed in the WW II D-Day invasion of Normandy.

“*Louis BramKamp was the uncle I looked forward to seeing every August. Our whole family would pile into the car and head upstate to Uncle Lou’s farm to spend a week each year, when my parent’s vacation time rolled around. After many miles of watching the morning fog lift over meadows of grazing deer and playing the many traveling games cooked up by my older sister, Catherine, and surviving the many long stages of the Route 80 construction we would finally pull into the driveway of the house on Orchard Rd.. Often, Uncle Lou would be the first to appear in the yard; a big, smiling giant, smelling of apples and earth, with his booming voice; giving my dad a hearty greeting and helping us carry our luggage up the little, winding staircase to Diane and Nancy’s room. I have fond memories of the fun and laughter as we helped make his hand-churned peach ice cream and, to this day, the scent of McIntosh apples sends me in memory to his back porch. In later years Uncle Lou’s farm was the place where I escaped for the occasional weekend, while I was attending college further down the Hudson. He carefully gave my fiancé a good looking over, before my mom did and always made me feel a warm welcome, whenever I walked through his door. His were the hands that held both of mine as I cried for the loss of my first child. A few years later, those same hands gently held my infant son. His were the head and shoulders we spotted first, as we pulled into the annual family reunions. His was often the last hand we saw raised in farewell as we started down the road for home, laden with the apples he had hauled to the Southern Tier, all the way from Hudson. I can never picture him without his big, ready smile...the same one that graces the faces of all three of his children. My world has been a happier place, filled with bright memories, because he was in it. Thanks Uncle Lou. I’ll miss you so much.*
