Robert A. Stitham, 84, of Greenport, died May 5, 2013 at the Veteran's Hospital in Albany. Born Nov. 18, 1928 in New Britain, CT, he was the son of the late Judith and Perley Stitham, Sr.

Robert served in the US Army from 1946-1950. He worked for Ben Funk, Inc. for many years. He was a member of Agawamuck Lodge #841 F.&A.M. and Past Worshipful Master, Widow's Son Lodge #335 in Livingston, Lafayette Commandry #7 in Hudson and Past Commander, Trinity Priory #5 Knights of the York Cross of Honour, Past District Deputy Grand Master, Columbia Masonic District, Past President Past Masters Unit of Cyprus Temple A.A.O.N.M.S, Past President Columbia County Shrine Club, and a charter member and life member of Columbia County Disabled American Veterans #194. He was awarded the Honorable Order of ISHSODI from Grand Council of Cryptic Masons State of New York.

Robert is survived by his wife, Ida Mae Stitham of Greenport, a son, Robert H. Stitham of Clifton Park, a grandson, Shawn Stitham of Hudson, a granddaughter, Teka Stitham of Glens Falls, and a great-grandson, Shawn Stitham, Jr. of Chatham.
